Report: Tuesday 9th February 2021

"Native Mediterranean Plants & Their
Use in British Gardens" by Brian Fisher.

Getting to grips with the "new technology" and returning to the society after a gap of 8 years Brian brightened a dark cold winter's evening with lots of colourful pictures taken on dry sunny days and reminding us of how plants cope with the "rigours" of a Mediterranean climate wherever they occur in the world: warm wet winters and hot dry summers.

From both Europe and South Africa there are a wide variety of spring bulbs which hibernate over the summer. Other plants have silvery foliage to reflect the sun, whilst having small hairy leaves or even no leaves at all are also useful strategies to minimise water loss. Deep roots are also good news!

Gardening in an area of South Oxfordshire with little or no surface water, you will probably spot a variety of "Mediterranean"

Plants" already coping well in your garden. As climate changes you should look after them! Like me you may however have to learn the lesson that some of these plants actually need it to be dry to stress them into flowering! Take Brian's advice and don't water too neurotically!

Diary from the RHS

Spring arrives

Spring usually arrives by mid-March and the frequent sunny days provide the opportunity for an increasing range of gardening tasks. It's time to get busy preparing seed beds, sowing seed, cutting back winter shrubs and generally tidying up around the garden.

Top 10 jobs this month

- 1 Protect new spring shoots from slugs 2 Plant shallots, onion sets and early potatoes
- 3 Plant summer-flowering bulbs
- 4 Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials
- 5 Top dress containers with fresh compost
- 6 Mow the lawn on dry days (if needed)
- 7 Cut back Cornus (dogwood) and Salix (willow) grown for colourful winter stems
- 8 Hoe and mulch weeds to keep them under control early
- 9 Start feeding fish and using the pond fountain; remove pond heaters10 Prune bush and climbing roses

Did you Know?

Poinsettia is a Euphorbia

Poinsettias are cheery plants that are widely grown indoors over Christmas for their brightly coloured bracts. They are often disposed of once they start to fade, but with a little care, you can keep them all year and the bracts will colour up again the following year.

Poinsettia (Euphorbia pulcherrima) is considered to be considerably less toxic than other Euphorbia species. However, it is best to avoid ingestion and contact with milky sap that may cause skin and eye irritation.
