## <u>Talk Report: Tuesday 13th March 2021</u> <u>via Zoom. "Gardening In Small Spaces"</u> by Camilla Phelps

Our '20/'21 winter talks season closed with another well attended Zoom presentation by London based garden designer and writer Camilla Phelps.

Always a city gardener Camilla began by reminding us that even some of our most renowned big gardens like Sissinghurst include small garden "rooms" as key elements. Small well-designed spaces can provide havens of tranquility and interest throughout the year.

Camilla's tips for making the most of small spaces included:-

- · Create illusions of space by, for example, including window like mirrors.
- · Exploit every inch of space, including verticals by using shelves or hanging pots, well behaved climbers like the "chocolate" vine, star jasmine or runner beans chosen

for their flowers as much as eating qualities!

- · Use pots to enable you to "ring the changes" and provide year-round interest.
- · Don't be afraid of trees though do ensure they will not damage buildings!
- · Exploit shade loving plants to add light and colour.
- · Have fun, perhaps by planting in unusual containers!
- · Give yourself somewhere comfortable to sit & enjoy what you have created!

I hope this and our other winter talks have given members both interest and ideas for the coming summer! For my part, fingers crossed, I have now finalised our talks for 2022, watch this space!

## Diary from the RHS

May: Summer is on its way!

As bulbs fade and herbaceous borders grow in leaps and bounds, it is now clear that summer is approaching. Sowing and planting out bedding can begin, depending on regional weather variations, and you can take softwood cuttings. It is also time to get back into the lawn mowing regime, as the lawn will be loving the warmer temperatures this month brings.

## Top 10 jobs this month

- 1. Watch out for late frosts. Protect tender plants
- 2. Earth up potatoes, and promptly plant any still remaining
- 3. Plant out summer bedding at the end of the month (except in cold areas)
- 4. Water early and late to get the most out of your water, recycle water when possible
- 5. Regularly hoe off weeds
- 6. Open greenhouse vents and doors on warm days
- 7. Mow lawns weekly

- 8. Check for nesting birds before clipping hedges
- Lift and divide overcrowded clumps of daffodils and other spring-flowering bulbs
- 10. Watch out for viburnum beetle and lily beetle grubs
