# Report: "Beth Chatto: A Life With Plants" by Catherine Horwood

Trialling an annual Zoom talk in January allowed members to enjoy a presentation on Beth Chatto, one of the most influential horticulturalists of recent times, by her personally chosen biographer - Catherine Horwood - without anyone venturing out on a cold dark night!

Brought up in East Anglia in modest circumstances by parents who were keen amateur gardeners, the then Bessie Little inherited their enthusiasm for plants but had a burning ambition to teach. Her horticulture interests were however turbocharged when she met and married the older and much better off Andrew Chatto, already a well-travelled and extremely knowledgeable plantsman. Strongly influenced by artist Cedric Morris, the by-now Beth and Andrew developed several gardens and a specialist nursery in the Colchester area.

Naturalistic and environmentally sound gardens and displays then became Beth's passion (as Catherine hinted, she had at least one other!). Meanwhile Andrew's contributions were somewhat drier: scientific or finance based.

Overall Beth Chatto's love of plants, vision, imagination, determination and perfectionism, combined to enable her revolutionise much about modern ornamental gardens and, certainly, RHS shows.

#### RHS Gardening in February

Spring is in sight!

This month there are signs of the approaching spring, with bulbs appearing and wildlife waking up as light levels and temperatures increase. There's plenty to do indoors this month to prepare for the season ahead. Outdoors, as the garden comes to life again, it's time to prune shrubs and climbers, such as Wisteria as well as evergreen hedges.

### Top gardening jobs this month

1 Prepare vegetable seed beds, and sow some vegetables under cover

Knowing which vegetables to sow where, when and how means you can maintain constant supplies throughout the season.

Sow vegetable seeds

2 Chit potato tubers

It is important with earlies, and a good idea with maincrops, to 'chit' the seed

potatoes before planting. This means allowing them to start sprouting shoots.

3 Protect blossom on apricots, nectarines and peaches

Most top fruit and soft fruit are very hardy but once they start into growth in spring, flowers and buds are especially vulnerable to frost and may need protection to crop well.

Protect fruit from frost

- 4. Net fruit and vegetable crops to keep the birds off
- 5. Prune winter-flowering shrubs that have finished flowering
- 6. Divide bulbs such as snowdrops, and plant those that need planting 'in the green'

7. Prune Wisteria

- 8. Prune hardy evergreen hedges and renovate overgrown deciduous hedges
- 9. Prune conservatory climbers such as bougainvillea
- 10. Cut back deciduous grasses left uncut over the winter, remove dead grass from evergreen grasses

### The Queen's Green Canopy: Plant a Tree for the Jubilee

<u>Celebrate The Queen's Platinum Jubilee in</u> 2022 by being part of The Queen's Green <u>Canopy.</u>

The Queen's Green Canopy (QGC) is a tree planting initiative created to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee in 2022. Everyone across the UK is being invited to plant trees from October 2021, when the tree planting season begins, through to the end of the Jubilee year in 2022.

The Queen's Green Canopy will create a network of individual trees, avenues,



copses and whole woodlands in honour of The Queen's service and the legacy she has built.

This will create a green legacy of its own, with every tree planted bringing benefits for people, wildlife and climate, now and for the future.

#### Get involved

Whether you're joining neighbours or a community group, or planting as a school or organisation, every tree makes a difference.

Any trees planted from October 2021 to the end of the jubilee year in 2022 can be part of the QGC. Tree planting season is October to March - this is when roots are dormant and new trees will have the best chance of flourishing. Why not use the summer months to plan your planting and arrange a day of celebration?

Before you apply you'll need to:

- Know the six digit grid reference for the land you wish to plant using the grid reference finder
- Have permission from the legal landowner
