Tuesday 10<sup>th</sup> January 2023 at 7.30pm via Zoom. "10 Ways To A Better Garden" by Doug Stewart.

So please join us to hear a Yorkshireman's guide to a better garden!

Never really intending to become a horticulturist Doug began gardening at 13, rented an allotment and began earning pocket money by selling vegetables through his local shop. After formal training he had various jobs: a lecturer in cucumber & tomato production, a pumpkin grower, plant propagator, interior landscaper and garden designer. Then followed 20 years as Head of Horticulture at a specialist college and then 15 years as consultant, speaker and trainer. Now he co-presents The Great Outdoors, a gardening phone in on BBC Radio Humberside. A real expert to get us off to a great gardening year!

Turner and a collaborator of the equally famous architect Lutyens, is often credited with taking perennial flower borders to a new level. # Talk Report: Tuesday 8th November. "Death in the Garden" by Michael Brown ("The Historic Gardener")

A dark November evening began spookily with a missing speaker and gremlins refusing to allow the hall AV projector to start. However brave members quickly sorted out these problems allowing an informative and thought provoking talk to begin on time!

Running through nearly thirty different plants more-or-less commonly found in British gardens which can make you ill or worse, Michael both entertained and hopefully educated us.

Some of these "problem" plants, such as Deadly Nightshade (Atropa belladonna), come as no surprise or problem if identified. With bright red sweet tasting berries, only 18 of which are required to kill, it can still be very dangerous to the unwary. The relatively common herbaceous plant Monkshood (Aconitum) has also been used as a murder weapon when added to a curry!

Learning that plants such as Hellebores, Morning Glory, Nicotiana and even Basil, in excess, can have some very nasty effects definitely reinforced the message:- if you are not absolutely sure what it is don't eat it or even expose yourself to its sap!

#### Show Administration requirement

# RHS Gardening in January

Often the coldest month

January might be the middle of winter but as the days lengthen the garden starts to grow. Now is a great time to plan for the coming gardening year and to order seeds and plants. Enjoy the fresh air, on dry sunny days, and check your winter protection, stakes, ties and supports are still working after any severe weather. Also put out food for birds and leave some garden areas uncut, a little longer, to provide shelter for wildlife in your garden. Top gardening jobs this month

1 Prune apple and pear trees

Pruning an apple or pear tree can be daunting for many gardeners. Rather than be put off completely or panic and inadvertently harm the tree back by excessive pruning, instead try our easy guide and enjoy a well-shaped, productive tree.

2 Clean pots and greenhouses ready for spring

Cleaning greenhouses, whether glass or plastic, greatly improves the growing environment for plants. By removing the algae, moss and grime it lets in more light and helps control pests and diseases too. 3 Dig over any vacant plots that have not been dug already

Soil cultivation or digging may be hard work but, if taken slowly, it need not be back-breaking.

4 Disperse worm casts in laws

5 Inspect stored tubers of Dahlia, Begonia and Canna for rots or drying out

6 Recycle your Christmas tree by

shredding it for mulch

7 Start forcing rhubarb

8 Plan your vegetable crop rotations for the coming season

9 Keep putting out food and water for hungry birds

10 Make a polythene shelter for outdoor peaches and nectarines, to protect against peach leaf curl
