For our now established February afternoon talk we will welcoming Maggie Tran, originally a Fine Arts graduate, to speak on her experiences as Head Gardener at the historic Bramdean House in Hampshire.

<u>Talk Report:</u> Tuesday 14th November 2023 "Tenerife: A Botanical Honeypot" by Timothy Walker

Miserable November weather cleared up in time to encourage a good audience to turn out for a virtual visit to this sub-tropical island guided by Timothy Walker, an expert on this unique island's plant life from Oxford University.

In a beautifully illustrated, amusing but highly informative talk Timothy explained how the unique history and geography of Tenerife had provided a perfect environment for plants to establish themselves and evolve into a myriad of different species and forms in an island roughly the size of Oxfordshire. The result being that to date botanists know of 800 different plant species found naturally only on Tenerife, whereas here in Oxfordshire there are none!

A geologically young island with distinct wet and dry sides and a very high central mountain where snow falls in winter and it is hot most days and freezes most nights is a tough place to grow but also provides lots of opportunities if you are adaptable!

To illustrate the resulting "honeypot" of plant life Timothy took us on an imaginary journey from the west dry side of Tenerife up and over Mt Tiede and down to the damper east coast. A journey taken every year in May by Oxford University Plant Science students on their annual field trip.

To start with low thorny drought tolerant plants, including some leafless cactus-like euphorbias, predominate. Then leafier shrubs, including tree-like heathers and very different euphorbias, take over. Next we come to a region where we find *Isoplexis isabelliana*, a foxglove - but not as we know it - with normal flower spikes but orange in colour and borne on a perennial herbaceous shrub! There is also a perennial convolvulus which is much better behaved than our bind weed!

Mt. Tiede itself is home to a towering Echium, which tolerates daily extreme temperatures but doesn't like the long cold spells we have in Oxfordshire! Then, as we descend, canary laurel and pine forests take over but with deep, steep sided "barrancas" (gorges) where some plants can be found which grow no where else, even on Tenerife!

So, if you love plants and would like to see some we grow in our gardens in their natural habitat, take a trip to Tenerife and leave the beaches and flesh pots behind for a few days!

<u>RHS Jobs for January</u>

Gardening in January often the coldest month

January might be the middle of winter but as the days lengthen the garden starts to grow. Now is a great time to plan for the coming gardening year and to order seeds and plants. Enjoy the fresh air, on dry sunny days, and check your winter protection, stakes, ties and supports are still working after any severe weather. Also put out food for birds and leave some garden areas uncut, a little longer, to provide shelter for wildlife in your garden.

- 1. Prune apple and pear trees
- 2. Clean pots and greenhouses ready for spring
- Cleaning greenhouses, whether glass or plastic, greatly improves the growing environment for plants. By removing the algae, moss and grime it lets in more light and helps control pests and diseases too.
- 4. Dig over any vacant plots that have not been dug already
- Soil cultivation or digging may be hard work but, if taken slowly, it need not be back-breaking. This can often be omitted or at least minimized if you have a no-dig regime.
- 6. Disperse worm casts in lawns
- Inspect stored tubers of Dahlia, Begonia and Canna for rots or drying out
- 8. Recycle your Christmas tree by shredding it for mulch
- 9. Start forcing rhubarb
- 10. Plan your vegetable crop rotations for the coming season
- 11. Keep putting out food and water for hungry birds
- 12. Make a polythene shelter for outdoor peaches and nectarines, to protect against peach leaf curl
